This is a list of some charities and resources I use when helping people de-clutter or empty spaces.

FURNITURE

Bridging (Drop offs in Bloomington and Roseville.) - www.bridging.org Provides furniture and home goods to people transitioning out of homelessness and poverty. Accepts new or gently used furniture (free of rips, stains, pet hair). Pick-ups can be scheduled for a fee. 952-888-1105

Will pick up furniture when at least three items are being donated (may be a small fee). Items can also be dropped off at the Minneapolis store. Please call ahead if you plan to make a large donation. 612-871-8305

CLOTHING & HOUSEHOLD ITEMS

Textiles and clothes that are stained or torn can still be donated to many places. Items are sold to recyclers with proceeds benefiting the organization. See websites or call for specific guidelines.

Sarah's accepts items including women's toiletries, small and medium sized clothing, backpacks, school supplies, alarm clocks, umbrellas, kitchen utensils and towels, good condition twin mattresses and bedding, end tables and desks, lamps, good condition area rugs and other items.

Donations of clothing (especially men's), towels, sheets, small household items, jackets, hats, new socks and underwear, as well as other items are needed. Donations may be brought to the main south entrance of the church anytime the campus is open. Tax receipt forms are available. Items are given to those in need at no charge.

CHILD AND INFANT

Tapestry Pregnancy and Family Resource Center (South Minneapolis) – www.tapestryfamilies.org Tapestry is one of the only locations in the Twin Cities that accepts car seats, strollers, and other infant items that most organizations cannot take due to liability concerns. All items are thoroughly checked and vetted by their staff before distribution. Clothes, toys, books, and all things size newborn through 6T accepted. Visit website for donation hours.

ELECTRONIC RECYCLING

Some solid waste pick-up companies take electronics. Contact the property's waste management provider to find out if and how they take electronics.

Best Buy - http://www.bestbuy.com/ (See Services, Recycle Your Old Products) All Best Buy locations should accept used electronics for recycling. There is a limit of 3 items per household per day including no more than 2 TVs. Contact store site to confirm hours and what is accepted.

City or County Hazardous Waste Collection Site (See list under Hazardous Waste. May have fees.)

Tech Dump (Golden Valley and St. Paul) - http://www.techdump.org/ Tech Dump recycles electronics for a fee while providing job training and practical experience for adults facing barriers to employment. 612-213-1805

GENERAL MATERIAL DISPOSAL

Contact the property's waste management service provider. Many companies will pick up large items that meet specific guidelines (weight, size, material). If Waste Management will not pick it up check the county websites listed below for information on transfer stations (dumps).

Hazardous Waste

Items that may cause harm to the environment if disposed with other trash (pesticides, pool chemicals, engine oil, antifreeze, paint, gas, fluorescent bulbs, etc.) should be taken to a Hazardous Waste collection site. Counties differ in what they will accept. See websites for complete details.
